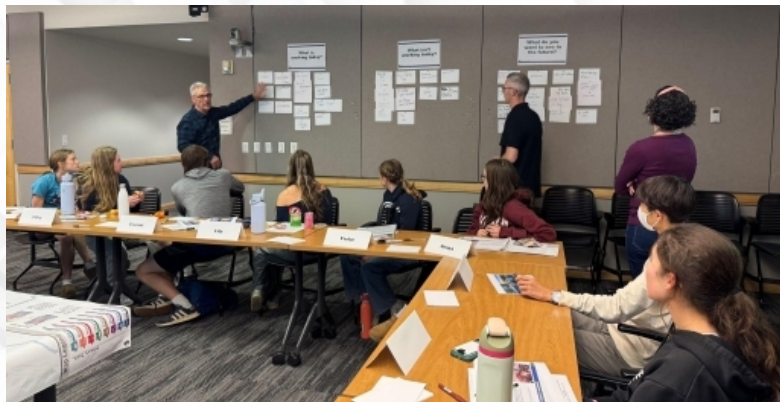
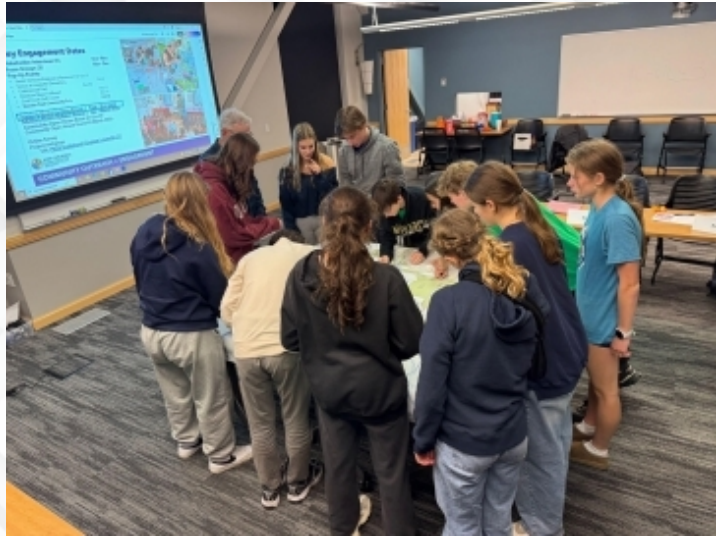

**Summary:**

A resolution creating an Historic Preservation Tax (HPT) Task Force and appointing members of said task force. The purpose of the task force will be to consider and advise Council on the possible expansion of, use of, and future amount of the City's Historic Preservation Tax.

**Background / Prior Discussions:**

City Council discussed a potential ballot question related to the HPT during their April 28 Meeting and provided direction for a task force to be created, implemented, and provide a recommendation to City Council during their June 16 Council meeting.

Council recommended the following membership:

- 2 Council Members
- 1 Historic Preservation Commission Member
- 1 Historical Museum Board Member
- 1 Architect
- 1 Chamber member (representing business has not previously benefited from the program)
- 2 Community members from general public

**Analysis:**

Due to the tight timeline, staff first set the meeting dates (see proposed timeline below), working back from the June 16 Council meeting, and then provided the information to Council members and asked for their recommendations of task force members.

- Selecting one architect and two community members from the pool of candidates
  - Council may want to consider prioritizing individuals who were recommended by multiple members of Council, diversity of ward representation, and/or those who can make all of the meetings in person (the task force is currently structured as an in-person only meeting, though staff could pivot based on Council direction)

Proposed Timeline:

- MAY 12 - Council resolution creating and appointing the task force:
- MAY 13, 4-7pm (Wednesday) – First Meeting – Focused on education and understanding
- MAY 28, 4-7 pm (Thursday) - Second Meeting – Focused on discussion and recommendation
- JUNE 1, 4-7pm (Monday) - Reserved in case the task force needs more time
- JUNE 3 – Council packet materials due
- JUNE 16 – Task force recommendation before City Council

Community members are welcome to attend task force meetings, email City Council with their thoughts, participate in the June 16th (or any other) Council meeting, and participate in subsequent meetings on the topic if Council chooses to proceed with a ballot question.

**Council Work Plan:**

The 2026 Louisville City Council Work Plan includes consideration of alternatives and potential next steps ahead of the Historic Preservation Tax's 2028 expiration under the Core Services priority.

**Fiscal Impact:**

The Historic Preservation Tax is a one-eighth of one percent (0.125%) tax for the purpose of preserving the historic character of Louisville. This amounts to a little over \$0.01 for every \$10 spent. The existing temporary tax is set to expire on December 31, 2028. The tax generates approximately \$1M annually, of which 20% is allocated to fund the Louisville Historical Museum Campus.

**Alternatives:**

As this tax does not expire until 2028, Council may choose to delay consideration for a future ballot cycle. It is important to consider the work already started for the task force, including time commitments from potential members, with the task force's first meeting scheduled for the day after the Council meeting. If Council chooses to significantly modify or delay the task force, that work and those commitments will be impacted. Council may also choose to modify the composition of the task force.

**Recommendation:**

Staff recommends City Council appoint members to the Historic Preservation Tax Task Force and support the resolution creating the task force.

**RESOLUTION NO. 43  
SERIES 2026**

**A RESOLUTION CREATING A HISTORIC PRESERVATION TAX TASK FORCE AND  
APPOINTING MEMBERS TO SUCH TASK FORCE**

**WHEREAS**, at the November 4, 2008 election, the City’s voters approved the levy of a 0.125% sales tax, to be collected for a ten-year period commencing January 1, 2009, with the net proceeds of such 0.125% percent sales tax to be collected, retained and spent exclusively for historic preservation purposes within historic Old Town Louisville; and

**WHEREAS**, at the November 7, 2017 election, the City’s voters approved an extension of the City’s temporary sales tax for historic preservation purposes for an additional ten years, commencing January 1, 2019, expanded the area within which such sales tax proceeds may be spent from historic Old Town Louisville to Citywide, provided that any expenditure of such funds outside historic Old Town Louisville must be approved by the affirmative vote of not less than five members of the entire City Council, and authorized the annual expenditure of up to twenty percent of the net proceeds of historic preservation sales and uses taxes for operating and maintaining the Louisville Museum Campus; and

**WHEREAS**, with such temporary sales tax expiring on December 31, 2028, the City Council desires to solicit the input and advice from community members on the possible expansion of, use of, and future extension and amount of this Historic Preservation Tax; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Charter Section 10-2(f), the City Council desires to establish an Historic Preservation Tax Task Force to provide advisory recommendations on whether to seek voter approval of an extension to this tax and, if so, in what amount and for what uses.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY  
OF LOUISVILLE, COLORADO:**

**Section 1.** There is hereby created an Historic Preservation Tax Task Force, comprised of the following eight persons: two Councilmembers, one Historic Preservation Commission member, one Historical Museum Board member, one architect, one member of the Louisville Chamber of Commerce (representing a business that has not previously benefitted from the programs funded by the Historic Preservation Tax), and two community members:

- A. Mayor Chris Leh and Councilmember Deb Fahey
- B. Sloane Whidden (Historic Preservation Commission member)
- C. \_\_\_\_\_ (Historical Museum Board member)

- D. \_\_\_\_\_ (Architect)
- E. \_\_\_\_\_ (Chamber of Commerce)
- F. \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_ (community members)

**Section 2.** The goals of the Task Force shall be to consider whether voters should be asked to approve an extension of the expiring Historic Preservation Tax; and if so, in what amount and whether the uses of the revenues derived from such tax should be expanded to include additional funding opportunities.

**Section 3.** The City Manager shall designate appropriate City staff to facilitate, assist and advise the Task Force as it works to achieve the goals specified above.

**Section 4.** The Task Force shall conclude its work and present its recommendations to the City Council by no later than June 30, 2026.

**Section 5.** The Task Force shall sunset without further action by the City Council on July 31, 2026.
